- 1984: Sony v. Universal (Betamax case)
- 1991: Linux project

- 1998: "Open Source"; Digital Millenium Copyright Act
- 2001: A&M v. Napster; Creative Commons; Wikipedia
- o 2001-2: US v. ElcomSoft
- o 2005 MGM v. Grokster

"Legislating for Innovation"

- An open letter to specific members of congress, written in their terms
- Makes parallel appeals to politicians' various selfish and unselfish interests
- Makes actionable recommendations
- Reiterates central theses in three passes (in 1 ¶, 1 page, et al.)

Central Theses

- Strong intellectual property will not promote innovation in high-tech
- Administration risks wasting its R&D investments by pushing strong IP
- Shifting cultural norms will make strong-IP stance politically unsafe

Prioritized Recommendations

- Protect user and developer rights and restore the Betamax standard
- Tie ACI funds to open rather than proprietary development
- Replace DMCA-style copyright protection with integrated and open rights standards and compulsory licensing
